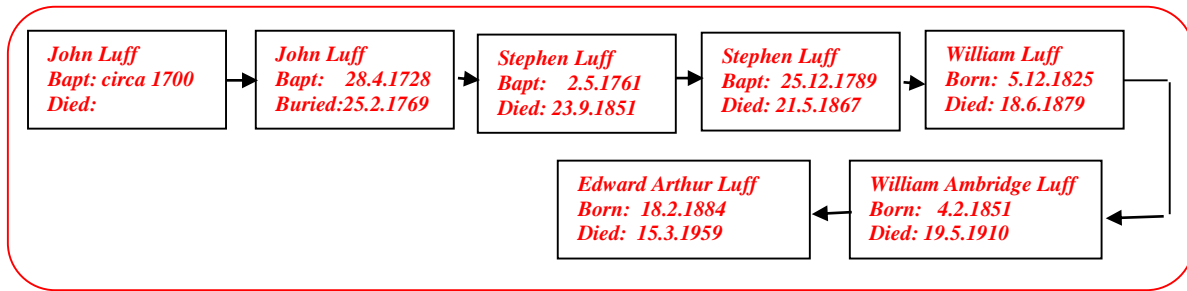


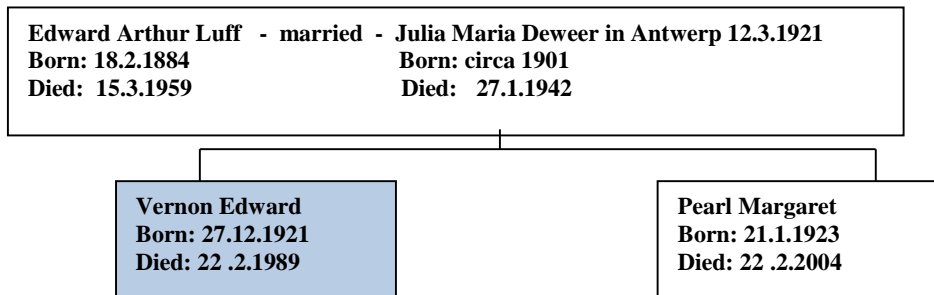

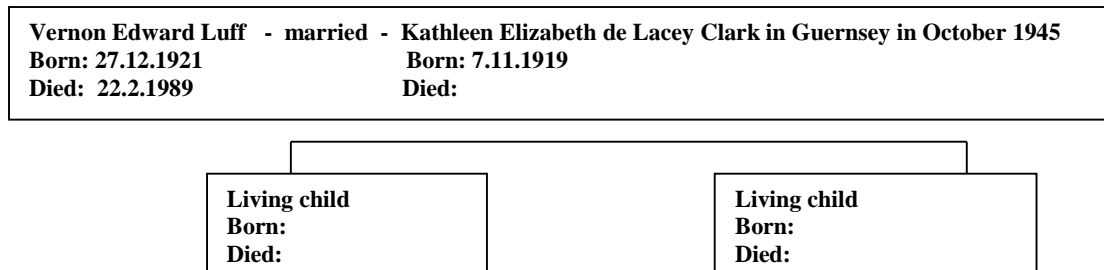
Family Lineage:

TWO GUERNSEYMEN IN HONOURS LIST



JURAT B. BARTLETT

CONGRATULATIONS to Jurat Bertram Bartlett and Mr. Vernon E. Luff, who receive decorations in the New Year's Honours List. Jurat Bartlett is awarded the O.B.E. and Mr. Luff the M.B.E.

Jurat Bartlett, also a councillor, is president of the Island Reception Committee and president of the Agriculture and Fisheries Committee. Mr. Luff is secretary to States Committees. Both had a great deal to do with the arrangements for the royal visit of last summer.

Jurat Bartlett entered the States in 1930 as a deputy and as well as showing himself to be an able debater served assiduously on the many committees to which he was elected. But his onerous duties in the States have not caused him to shirk parochial work in St. Martin's, the parish in which he lives, or to refrain from leading a busy life in many spheres.

He is a member of the Rotary Club and for some years was president of the Chamber of Commerce. He has been one of the mainstays of the Odd Fellow movement in the island and his services in this respect were rewarded some years ago when he received the highest award that may be presented to an Odd Fellow.

ELECTED JURAT

Jurat Bartlett was one of the original councillors elected to the Councillors' bench when the States were reconstituted. In November, 1950, he was elected to the Jurats' bench.

During the Occupation Jurat Bartlett was deported and interned at Biberach and on his return regained his seat as a deputy and once again entered into public service with the same energy and ability as had characterised his work before the war. As president of the Island Reception Committee he is concerned in entertaining important personalities who visit the island and played an important part in the preparations for last year's royal visit. He is also president of the States Committee for Agriculture and Fisheries. For many years he has identified himself closely with the Southern Agricultural and Horticultural Society and as its president is striving to lead the society back to stability after a lean time in the post war years.
